Kappa Delta Epsilon also took part in the Prouty and raised over \$16000 - the most of any participating Greek organization!

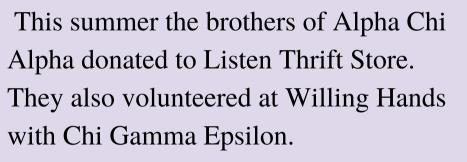
