

CLASS OF 2027 ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

To graduate you need to:

- Complete **35 course credits**, and take 3 Wellness/Physical Education (WE/PE) Credits
- **In your first year**, complete the **Writing Requirement** (either by taking WRIT 5, WRIT 2/3, or HUM 1) *and* your **First Year Seminar Requirement** (also fulfilled by HUM 2).

The FY Seminar is *always* taken the term following completion of your Writing Requirement.

- Complete the **Language requirement**. Language credit may be fulfilled in a variety of ways depending on the level of your language background; your DegreeWorks degree audit in DartHub will tell you what path you are following.

- Fulfill **Distributive Requirements** and **World Culture Requirements**
 - **Note:** Most distributives will be fulfilled as you elect courses that you find interesting. Be mindful of your own four-year planning, needs to complete sequenced courses, intentions for off-campus programs, etc., but don't worry too much about distributives during your first term, or even your first year.
- Fulfill the **Requirements of a Major** (although you don't declare until the end of your sophomore year, during your fifth "R" term)

Distributive Requirements

1. Art: creation, performance, history or criticism (ART);
2. Literature: the history, criticism or theory of texts (LIT);
3. Systems and Traditions of Thought, Meaning and Value (TMV);
4. International or comparative study (INT);
- 5 & 6. Social analysis (two courses) (SOC);
7. Quantitative or deductive science (QDS);
- 8 & 9. Natural and physical science (two courses); without/with lab (SCI/SLA);
10. Technology or applied science; without/with lab (TAS/TLA)

At least one of the science courses must have a laboratory, experimental or field component (LAB).

World Culture (WC) Requirement:

1. Western Cultures (W)
2. Non-Western Cultures (NW)
3. Culture and Identity (CI)

COURSE ELECTION TIMETABLE AND MUST-DOS

Friday, September 1 or Tuesday, September 5

- Attend Group Advising (Required)
- Look at **Placement Record** to determine placement, Writing-requirement schedule, and your faculty advisor. (Degree Works and DartHub)
 - *If* scheduled for **WRIT 5** in Fall term, select three that interest you
- **Email your faculty advisor** to make an appointment (especially if you have not already heard from them)
- Explore the **Curriculum**, using [Explore](#), [Engage](#), [Excel](#), ORC, and Timetable
 - Consider **8–12 courses** you may be interested in taking
- Complete the **Advising Questionnaire** through DartHub before you meet with your faculty advisor

Thursday, September 7

- Attend Department and Program **Open Houses**
- Refine your list of interesting courses:
 - Are you choosing something that will challenge you?
 - Something that you've always wanted to explore?
 - Something in a discipline you hope to pursue further?
 - Are you being conscious of time management and the increased demands of college-level courses?

Friday, September 8

- Meet with your faculty advisor at appointed time for **Academic Advising**
- **Register your Fall courses** on-line before 6:00PM
- View the courses you've been placed into after 8:00 PM

Saturday and Sunday, September 9–10

- **Add/Drop** Available starting at 8:00 AM for First-Year and Transfer students only for course adjustments
- Monitor Timetable for course availability, including for Writing 5 sections

Monday, September 11

- **Classes begin, 7:45 A.M.**
- **Add/Drop** Open to all students
